

On motion, it is ordered that City of Pikeville, pay for the lowering and removing the dirt from the alley between F.J. Hatcher and Ernest and Violet Walker property.

On motion, the street committee is directed to investigate the condition of existing the barn of Lida E. Hillier and have same removed if they think it proper to do so.

On motion of J.D. Meade duly seconded, it is ordered that A.B. Cochran, be and he is hereby excommunicated from paying a city license for selling spectacles in the corporate limits of the City of Pikeville Ky. for and during his natural life.

On May the 7<sup>th</sup> 1917, an ordinance known as the Hog ordinance was introduced and passed by the majority of the members of the Board of Council present. Said ordinance was vetoed by the Mayor A.J. Jackson, which is as follows:

To the Hon. City Clerk and City Council of the City of Pikeville,

You are hereby notified that I as Mayor of said City, refuse to approve or sign and by this do veto the ordinance passed at the last regular meeting of the City Council known as the Hog law or ordinance permitting all persons in the corporate limits of said City to keep hogs within 75 ft. of any residence or houses of business for the following reasons:

- 1<sup>st</sup> That it is contrary to the welfare of the Statebrook of health.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> That it renders the City unsanitary and is at a time of the year when liable to create an epidemic of fever etc.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> That the distance of 75 ft. is not a sufficient distance to insure a safe and sanitary conditions.
- 4<sup>th</sup> That the passage of said ordinance would create a nuisance in the City, and is not passed in good faith for the welfare and benefit of the public.

The above ordinance known as the Hog ordinance after having been vetoed by the Mayor of the City of Pikeville Ky. was presented to the Board

of Council for approval and passage. Same was approved and passed by a roll call of the vote which is as follows: J.M. Triplett, voting "aye". J.M. Coleman, voting "aye". I.C. Cleverly voting "aye". J.D. Meade voting "aye". J.L. Morgan and P.F. Prestero absent, The result being 4 for its passage. 2 absent. Thereupon the ordinance was passed, and so declared.

On motion Council was adjourned until 7 o'clock P.M. June 4<sup>th</sup> 1917.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Council held in the City Hall, June 11<sup>th</sup> 1917. Hon. A.J. Jackson Mayor and the following Councilmen present, J.M. Triplett, J.D. Meade. There not being a quorum to transact business, said meeting was adjourned until 7 o'clock, P.M. June, 11<sup>th</sup> 1917.
