at a regular meeting of the Board of Council for the city of Pikeville, Kentucky, held in the city hall on the 4th day of February, 1918: The following councilmen being present: Alex Elliott, F. F. Ratliff, Frank Connally, W. P. Call, J. J. Stone and Jim Duty.

The Mayor, J. L. Morgan being absent, councilman Alex Elliott nominated councilman F. F. Ratliff for mayor pro tem. upon motion by Frank Connally and seconded by W. P. Call that nomination be closed the same carried unanimously and F. F. Ratliff was elected mayor pro tem by unanimous vote.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The bond of E. M. Thomsbury, deputy policeman for the city of Pikeville, was offered, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried said bond was accepted by said city council, which is in words and figures as follows:

"United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company,

Know all men by these Presents:

That we, E. M. Thomsbury, as Principal, and the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, a corporation, duly incorporated under the laws of the State of Maryland, as Surety, are held and firmly bound unto the Commonwealth of Kentucky, for the use and benefit of the City of Pikeville, Kentucky, in the sum of One thousand Dollars (\$1000⁰⁰), lawful money of the United States of America, for the payment of which, well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns, jointly and severally, firmly by these presents.

Sealed with our seals, and dated this 14th day of January, 1918.

Whereas, the above bounden E. M. Thomsbury has been appointed Police Officer for the city of Pikeville, Kentucky.

Now, therefore, the condition of this obligation is such, that if the said E. M. Thomsbury shall from the 11th day of January, 1918, to the 11th day of January, 1919, well and faithfully perform all the duties of his said office, then this obligation to be void, otherwise to remain in full force and effect.



John Rogers, President of the Pikeville National Bank, appeared before the city council and explained to them that said Bank was erroneously or doubly assessed the sum of \$9400⁰⁰ on real estate for the year 1917, after discussion of said matter, and upon motion of Frank Connally, duly seconded by W. J. M. Nutcher, city Clerk, filed his settlement with
Sidney Trivette, Police Judge, for month of January, 1918,
which was accepted by Council.

J. M. Nutcher, city Clerk, offered to file statement with
E. B. Coleman, chief of Police, but it appearing to the Council
that said settlement has not been completely filled out, same
is ordered to lay over for said purpose until next regular
meeting of said Council.

Citizen John Brown appeared before the city Council and asked that he be permitted to put in sewer leading from the road down through his property from High Street toeller Street. He renewed his proposition made a year ago. Said matter is referred to the Street Committee and they are ordered to report at the next regular meeting of said city council.

The Health Committee and Street or Back up committee asked for further time in which to report.

It was moved by W. P. Call, seconded by J. J. Stone and unanimously carried that the Health Committee or Board of Health secure a doctor and that said doctor be allowed the sum of \$50⁰⁰ per year for his services as chairman of said Health Committee or Board of Health.

On motion Council is adjourned until next regular meeting.

The Council of the city of Pikeville met pursuant to call of J. L. Morgan, Mayor on the 18th day of February, 1918, in the city hall, Pikeville, Pike County, Kentucky, for the purpose of discussing question of sewage system and under grade passage at the mouth of Francis Hollow and Riddle Hollow in the city of Pikeville, Kentucky, and for the further purpose of acting on same as the council saw fit. The following were present: J. L. Morgan, Mayor, and Councilmen Frank Connally, Alex Elliott, Lem Duty and F. F. Ratliff.

Mr. M. C. Kirk, attorney for the C. & O. Railway addressed the council regarding the situation at Francis and Riddle Hollows. Also citizens D. L. Francis, H. M. Tostino and J. A. Scott addressed the council regarding said matter.

F. F. Ratliff moved that the C & O Railway Company be compelled to put in sufficient catch basins and sewerage system under the railroad and cross the street under the pavement to drain Francis Hollow; also sufficient catch basins and sewerage system to drain the properties at the Riddle Hollow in like manner. Said motion was seconded by Frank Connally and carried unanimously.

It was ordered that the city attorney draw an ordinance pursuant to above motion, to be approved at the next meeting of the council.

On motion duly made and seconded Council is adjourned until next regular meeting.

The mayor, J. L. Morgan, being absent, Councilman J. J. Stone nominated councilman F. F. Ratliff, for mayor pro tem; all members present voting for F. F. Ratliff he was declared elected mayor pro tem for said meeting.
