

The mayor appointed Alex Elliott as a member of the Street Committee to take the place of J. J. Stone, ex-councilman.

J. C. Cleveringa appeared and took the oath of councilman as required by law, which was administered by the city clerk.

It appearing that there ^{are} two members of the council on the health board, which appears to be illegal, F. G. Connally nominated D. T. Kell; Lem Duty nominated Bill Morris, and Alex Elliott nominated H. Pauley to compose a health board of citizens, all members of the council present voted for said Kell, Morris and Pauley and they were declared elected as said board.

The city clerk is requested to notify said D. T. Kell, Bill Morris and H. ^{Pauley} of their appointment or election as members of the Health Board of the city of Pikeville, Kentucky.

Councilman Alex Elliott is ordered to buy a fire gong to be placed at Huffman's ice plant.

Ordered that

Sandy Valley Light and Power Company be and it is hereby allowed the sum of \$477¹⁵ for city lights for quarter ending March 31, 1918 (being months of January, February and March, 1918).

F. F. Ratliff moved that the city attorney prepare an ordinance entitled allowing any person or persons, corporations or corporations to construct a sewer system or sewer systems so long as they comply with Section 3420, sub-section 9, of the Kentucky Statutes. On motion made, duly seconded and unanimously carried Council is adjourned until April 13th, 1918.

At a regular adjourned meeting of the Board of City Council of Pikeville, Kentucky, held in the city hall on the 13th day of April, 1918; The following members were present: Mayor, J. L. Morgan, Councilmen, J. C. Cleveringa, F. F. Ratliff, Alex Elliott and Lem Duty. The minutes of last meeting were read, ordered that

J. E. Scott be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$106⁰⁰ for cleaning streets the for month of March, 1918.

Ordered that

J. P. Morris be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$103⁹⁰ for dieting and keeping city prisoners from Feb. 1st, 1918, to April 1st, 1918, inclusive.

Pursuant to order of city council at its meeting held April 5th, 1918, A. L. Ratliff, city attorney, prepared and presented an ordinance allowing any person or persons, corporation or corporations to construct or maintain its sewerage system according to provisions of Kentucky Statutes, Section 3490, sub-section 9. Upon motion made and duly seconded same carried unanimously and was declared passed.

An ordinance was introduced for taping of motor vehicles operated in the corporate limits of the city of Pikeville. Upon motion made by J. C. Cleveringa, duly seconded by Lem Duty, said ordinance was voted upon, the vote being as follows upon roll call: J. C. Cleveringa "yea"; F. F. Ratliff "yea"; Alex Elliott, "yea" and Lem Duty "yea". Said ordinance was declared passed, no one present voting against same.

An ordinance was introduced requiring owners of property to equip the eaves of the roofs of buildings with water apparatus to prevent falling of water upon the side walks of the city of Pikeville. Upon motion made, and duly seconded, said ordinance was voted upon, the vote being as follows upon roll call: J. C. Cleveringa "yea"; F. F. Ratliff "yea"; Alex Elliott "yea", and Lem Duty, "yea". Said ordinance was declared passed, no one present voting against same.

The chief of police, E. B. Colman, and deputy policemen, E. M. Thornbury, are each hereby ordered to comply with ordinance relating to dog tax and perform their

full duty in regard to same and report to the city council at its next regular meeting. The city clerk is directed to deliver a copy of this order to each of said policeman.

An ordinance was introduced authorizing contract for sprinkling, sweeping and cleaning the streets and alleys of the city of Pikeville, Kentucky, and defining specifications, rules and regulations for said work, together with additional penalty for placing or causing to be placed trash, garbage and refuse on the streets, alleys and side walks therein. Upon motion duly made and seconded and unanimously carried said ordinance was declared passed, no one voting against same.

On motion made, duly seconded and unanimously carried council is adjourned until its next regular meeting.

At a regular meeting of the Board of city Council of the city of Pikeville, Kentucky, held in the city hall on the 6th day of May, 1918, the following were present: Hon. J. L. Morgan, Mayor, and Councilmen, F. F. Ratliff, Lem Duty, J. C. Clevinger, Alex Elliott and F. A. Connally.

J. C. Clevinger moved that the ordinance passed at the meeting of the council held April 13, 1918, taxing motor vehicles be repealed. Said motion was seconded by Lem Duty and the vote was as follows: J. C. Clevinger "yea"; F. F. Ratliff "yea"; F. A. Connally "yea"; Lem Duty "yea" and Alex Elliott "yea". All members present voting "yea" said ordinance was declared repealed.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and unanimously carried the city treasurer was directed to pay off two \$500⁰⁰ street paving bonds, which was done, and said two bonds being No. 54 Series "C" for \$500⁰⁰ and No. 11, Series "A" for \$500⁰⁰,

were burned by the city treasurer in the presence of the city council.

J. C. Clevinger moved that a committee of five citizens of the City of Pikeville, Kentucky, other than members of the council, be appointed by the mayor for the purpose of devising a plan to secure good and pure water for drinking and other purposes, of which two are to be attorneys at law. Said motion was seconded by Lem Duty and carried unanimously. The mayor appointed as members of said committee the following citizens of Pikeville: Jerry Robinson, Tom Williamson, P. B. Stratton, G. J. Jackson and G. F. Childers.

Upon motion made by Alex Elliott, duly seconded by J. C. Clevinger and carried unanimously, the citizens owning property on east side of Sixth Street from Scott Avenue to the river bank, and from Pike Avenue to Scott Avenue on the east side of Third Street are hereby directed to build side walks, subject to the approval of the city engineer and street committee.

A petition signed by owners of property fronting and abutting Keller Street was offered, requesting that said street be paved and that side walks be built abutting the entire pavement of said street. Said matter was referred to the street committee.

Upon motion made by J. C. Clevinger, seconded by F. F. Ratliff and unanimously carried, it is ordered that the location and direction of the sewer under the railroad at Francis Hollow be turned over to the city engineer and street committee and power vested in them to see that same is done.

It appearing that contract for cleaning streets etc. of the city has been duly advertised, and that Mr. McCay's bid of \$40⁰⁰ per month was the lowest bid; upon motion by F. F. Ratliff, seconded by Lem Duty and unanimously carried it was ordered that said bid be accepted, with bond to be approved by the council. The vote upon said motion was as follows: F. F. Ratliff "yea"; Lem Duty "yea"; J. C. Clevinger "yea"; F. A. Connally "yea" and Alex Elliott "yea".

The city clerk is directed to draw up a blank form for the street cleaner to use in making his monthly report.
