

Whereas, the mayor, J. L. It appearing that E.B. Coleman, chief of Police of the city of Pikeville, has paid over the money coming into his hands and having received his quitus from the Board of Council it is hereby ordered that the National Surety Company of New York, his bondsman, be and it is hereby released and discharged from any further liability upon said bond as chief of police.

A committee appointed at a mass meeting of citizens of Pikeville, held in the court house on March 1st, 1920, had filed report recommending certain matters with reference to organization of fire department of the city of Pikeville. Said report is filed and entitled "Fire Department Report" for identity and made a part of the city records.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and unanimously carried the above "Fire Department Report" and each

and every recommendation therein are adopted as a whole.

The said committee appointed at a mass meeting of citizens of Pikeville held in the court-house on March 1st, 1920, further had filed a report recommending a proposed water works system for the city of Pikeville, giving specifications thereto. Said report is filed, made a part of the city's records and marked "Water-Works System Report" for identity.

John Adkins moved that the above "Water Works System Report" be adopted, and that an election be called to vote on a bond issue as large as the city's property assessment will permit. D. L. Francis seconded said motion, upon roll call the vote was as follows: John Adkins, yes; D. L. Francis, yes; T. C. Bushkill, yes; George Coleman, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; S. M. Heriford, yes. The mayor declared said motion carried.

Reynolds, Stratton & Stephanian and the city attorney are appointed as a committee to do the legal work with reference to calling an election for the bonding of the town, with instructions to report to the council Thursday night, March 4th, 1920.

Whereas, the above Tom Braham has been appointed policeman for the city of Pikeville, Kentucky;

Now, therefore, the conditions of this obligation are such that if the said Tom Braham shall from the 11th day of March, 1920, to the 11th day of March, 1921, well and faithfully perform all the duties of his said office according to law and municipal ordinances, then this obligation to be void, otherwise remain in full force and effect.

If he fail to perform any of his said duties, we will forfeit and pay to the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use and benefit of the city of Pikeville any sum so adjudged not to exceed five thousand (\$5000⁰⁰) dollars.

In witness whereof, said principal has hereunto set his hand and seal, and the United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company has caused this bond to be sealed with its corporate seal ^{this} duly attested by the signature of its attorney in fact, the 11th day of March, 1920.
