

(continuance of meeting of August 31, 1920.)

George Coleman introduced an ordinance entitled "An ordinance providing for motor vehicle routes in the city of Pikeville, Kentucky; and prohibiting parking motor vehicles on streets and alleys over night," and moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. John McCowan seconded said motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows: George Coleman, yes; John McCowan, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; John Adkins, absent; T. C. Bushkirk, absent; Fred Repass, yes. The mayor declared said motion carried and said ordinance passed.

George Coleman introduced an ordinance entitled "An ordinance accepting Stanton Street as a public alley of the city of Pikeville," and moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. Frank Harrythe seconded said motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows: George Coleman, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; John Adkins, absent; T. C. Bushkirk, absent; Fred Repass, yes; John McCowan, yes. The mayor declared said motion carried and said ordinance adopted.

George Coleman introduced an ordinance entitled "An ordinance requiring weeds, grass and other rubbish to be moved and removed from abutting the sidewalks," and moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. John McCowan seconded said motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows: George Coleman, yes; John McCowan, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; Fred Repass, yes; T. C. Bushkirk, absent; John Adkins, absent. The mayor declared said motion carried and said ordinance adopted.

The Board of Public Works and City Engineer filed their report giving an estimate of the cost of sewer system and improvements to be made in South Pikeville, together with their recommendation, the estimated cost of which was \$13,507<sup>10</sup>.

George Coleman introduced an ordinance entitled an "Ordinance establishing a sewer district for the south end of the city of Pikeville" and moved that same be passed and adopted. Fred Repass seconded said motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows: George Coleman, yes; Fred Repass, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; John McCowan, yes; T. C. Bushkirk, absent; John Adkins, absent. The mayor declared said motion carried.

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pikeville, Kentucky, held in the city hall in the city of Pikeville, Kentucky, on the 6th day of September, 1920, the following were present: Mayor D.L. Francis, and councilmen, John Adkins, Frank Harrythe, T.C. Bushkirk, Fred Repass, George Coleman and John A. McCowan.

Ordered that

L.H. Whitman be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$34<sup>60</sup> for help for cleaning streets, shoeing city's horses and for tools during August, 1920.

Ordered that

Williams Feed Company be and it is hereby allowed the sum of \$45<sup>00</sup> for feed purchased by city for its team August 3rd & 6th, 1920.

Ordered that

L.H. Whitman be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$125<sup>00</sup> for salary for cleaning city's streets during months of August, 1920.

Ordered that

J.P. Cline be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$155<sup>00</sup> for 16 days during August and 5 days during September, 1920, as concrete inspector and special policeman.

Ordered that

J.W. Robinson be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$95<sup>00</sup> for 17 days work during August and 2 days work during September, 1920, as concrete and curb inspector.

Frank Harrythe introduced an ordinance to establish and prescribe a territory in the city of Pikeville in which pool rooms or billiard rooms shall not be conducted, operated or maintained, or the games of pool or billiards played, and declaring the operation or maintenance of such

room or rooms, or the playing of such games therein, to be unlawful, and a common and public nuisance, and affixing a penalty for violation of said ordinance; providing for the abatement of such nuisance, and prohibiting the issue of license in such places and territory," and moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. George Coleman seconded said motion, upon roll call the vote was as follows: Frank Horsyter, yes; George Coleman, yes; J. C. Bushkirk, yes; John Adkins, yes; Fred Repass, yes; John A. McCaway, yes. The mayor declared said motion carried and said ordinance adopted.

Ordered that

B. Walford be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$12<sup>00</sup> for 3 days work as special policeman during month of August, 1920, \$9<sup>00</sup>, and repairing stray fence during month of August, 1920, \$3<sup>00</sup>.

C. Bushkirk, upon motion made, duly seconded and carried, was sworn in as policeman for the city of Pikeville.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried it is ordered that the policemen be given authority to have cut and removed the grass, weeds &c from the side walks of the city of Pikeville.

Kelly Brothers filed their bid for the construction of sidewalks in the city of Pikeville heretofore advertised and ordered to be constructed; said bid being 45¢ per square foot.

Fred Repass moved that the bid of Kelly Brothers for the construction of side walks in the city of Pikeville, heretofore advertised and ordered constructed, at 45¢ per square foot be accepted. George Coleman seconded said motion, upon roll call the vote was as follows: Fred Repass, yes; George Coleman, yes; Frank Horsyter, yes; J. C. Bushkirk, not voting; John Adkins, yes; John A. McCaway, yes; the mayor declared said motion carried and said bid accepted.

Ordered that

Amick & Hayes be and they are hereby allowed the sum of \$120<sup>00</sup> for engineering services and help on paving work for city during month of August, 1920.

The ordinance entitled an "Ordinance establishing a sewer district for the south end of the city of Pikeville," passed at the meeting of council on August 31, 1920, was returned to the council on this day by the mayor with the following veto:

"City hall, Pikeville, Kentucky.  
Sept. 6, 1920.

To the City Council of City of Pikeville:  
Gentlemen:

I herewith return to you ordinance establishing a sewer for the south end of the city of Pikeville, without my approval for two reasons:

First: The city does not own a right of way over which to construct said sewer.

Second: The city is not in financial condition to raise the amount of money necessary to construct said sewer, as it is already in debt between \$12,000<sup>00</sup> and \$15,000<sup>00</sup>.

A. J. Patter be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$135<sup>00</sup> for salary as chief of police for month of August, 1920.

Ordered that

A. L. Ruffiff be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$50<sup>00</sup> for salary as city attorney for month of August, 1920.

Ordered that

W. W. Reynolds be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$60<sup>00</sup> for salary as police judge for month of August, 1920.

Ordered that

W. W. Reynolds be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$25<sup>00</sup> for clerk hire for police judges office for month of August, 1920.

Ordered that

G.S. Thompson be and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$100<sup>00</sup> for salary as city treasurer for months of January, February, March, April, May, June, July and August, 1920.

Mayor, D.L. Francis tendered his written resignation <sup>as mayor</sup> of the city of Pikeville and had same filed, which is in words and figures as follows:

I beg to respectfully hand you my resignation as mayor of the city of Pikeville, to take effect at once.

McCowan.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried John Adkins was elected mayor pro tem.

George Coleman moved that the resignation of D.L. Francis as mayor of the city of Pikeville Kentucky, tendered and filed September 6th, 1920, be accepted. Fred Repass seconded said motion, upon roll call the vote was as follows: George Coleman, yes; Fred Repass, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; John A. McCowan, yes; John Adkins, yes; T.C. Bushkill, absent. Said motion carried and said resignation was accepted.

Fred Repass moved that J.E. Chidlers be appointed and elected mayor of the city of Pikeville to fill the unexpired term of D.L. Francis, who was elected to fill the unexpired term of J.D. Morgan. George Coleman seconded said motion, upon roll call the vote was as follows: Fred Repass, yes; George Coleman, yes; John Adkins, yes;

John A. McCowan, yes; Frank Harrythe, yes; T.C. Bushkill, absent. Said motion carried and said Chidlers <sup>was</sup> duly elected mayor.

city clerk's settlement with chief of police for month of August, 1920, was accepted, filed and approved.

city clerk's settlement with police judge for month of August, 1920, was accepted, filed and approved.

John A. McCowan moved that each policeman of the city of Pikeville be required to make a separate written report to the city council at the end of each month, for their information, of all work done by each policeman, viz, warrants applied for, issued, executed and termination of same. Frank Harrythe seconded said motion, which carried.

upon motion made, duly seconded and carried council is adjourned until the first September 13th, 1920,
