

# MINUTES } CITY OF PIKEVILLE

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pikeville, Kentucky, convened and held in the city hall in the City of Pikeville, Kentucky, on the 17th day of September, 1935, the following were present:

Mayor, K. J. Day, and  
Councilmen, A. S. Johnson,  
H. E. Syck and  
G. C. Call.

Councilmen, Rush Sword, Arthur Fields and Clyde Childers, were absent.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried Oscar Sowards was granted permit to erect brick and frame building on High Street, pursuant to terms of all city ordinances, rules and regulations.

Will Prater appeared before the council and asked for donation to buy school books for certain orphan children, and said matter was passed for further consideration.

The City Clerk read to the council Protest to paving of that part of Sycamore Street not paved signed by owners of more than fifty percent of abutting property owners, said protest being to resolution adopted by the Council August 6, 1935, and being signed by Pikeville College, Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, and others; and after a general discussion regarding said matter no action was taken thereon.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried Judge Lewis was granted permit to build kitchen and dining room to his building on College Street, pursuant to terms of all city ordinances, rules and regulations.

Applications of Paintsville Nehi Bottling Company, Louis Cafe and New York Restaurant for beer license, together with bonds, were presented and read to the council. Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried said applications were accepted and bonds approved and city clerk directed to issue licenses accordingly.

Application and bond of New York Restaurant for whiskey license were presented and read to council, and upon motion made, duly seconded and carried same were accepted and approved, and city clerk directed to issue licenses accordingly.

The Mayor appointed H. E. Syck as acting mayor to represent the city during visit of Chamber of Commerce of Huntington, West Virginia, on September 18, 1935, it appearing that the mayor will be out of town on said date.

## ORDERED THAT:

J. L. Morgan be, and he is hereby allowed the sum of \$50.00 for serving first half of September, 1935, as special policeman in lieu of policeman J. H. Childers during said Childers' vacation, payable out of General Expenditure Budget Fund.

## ORDERED THAT:

Harman, Francis & Hobson be, and they are hereby allowed the sum of \$100.00 for legal services in connection with condemnation actions for widening Lower Cline Street, as per bill of date September 17, 1935, payable out of General Expenditure Budget Fund.

J. P. Hobson, Jr., Attorney, presented deed of date July 6, 1934, from Watt Tilden Curnutte and Perry Curnutte to City of Pikeville for strip of land adjoining Cline Street, to be used in widening of Cline Street, and asked that the city not charge said Curnutte heirs more than \$283.39 for old taxes owing said Curnutte Heirs to the city.

H. E. Syck moved that the Curnutte Heirs be allowed the sum of \$140.61 as balance purchase price for strip of land on Cline Street, pursuant to deed above mentioned, as follows: First, G. C. Rowe, sheriff, to be paid state and county taxes, and remainder to be paid to said Curnutte Heirs. A. S. Johnson seconded said motion, which carried.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried the law firm of Harman, Francis & Hobson, was employed to assist city attorney in injunction suit against Hi Pauley, Pauley Lumber Company and Pauley Lumber and Real Estate Company for building shed, storing of lumber &c on Second Street, or between Second and Main Streets, or taking such other legal steps as said firm and city attorney deem necessary in said matter.

H. E. Syck introduced an ordinance entitled "AN ordinance PROHIBITING THE STORING OF LUMBER WITHIN CERTAIN ZONES IN THE CITY OF PIKEVILLE; DEFINING SUCH ZONES; AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATION", and moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted. A. S. Johnson seconded said motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows:

The Mayor declared said motion carried and said ordinance duly passed and adopted.

Contract between the City of Pikeville and Chester, Laboon, Campbell, Davis and Bankson, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, of date August 23, 1935, wherein second party agreed to prepare valuation report of local gas system, together with analysis of operating statement, which contract was signed by first party and second party, was presented and approved by the council.

Denny Webb appeared in open council and stated that J. M. Bolling had fenced up street on top of Peach Orchard Hill, and asked that same be opened up; and said matter was referred to the Street Committee.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried Council is adjourned until its next regular meeting.

Councilmen, Arthur Fields, Rush Sword and A. S. Johnson, were absent.

Prof. T. W. Oliver, representing Pikeville High School, appeared in open council and stated that the School Board desired that the City pass a resolution so that the school board might borrow certain monies from the United States Government for purpose of erecting new school building, same to be only a moral and not a financial obligation on the part of the city.

H. E. Syck introduced the following resolution and moved the passage and adoption of same:

"The Pikeville City Council in regular session, Oct. 1, 1935, resolves to adopt the Application of the Pikeville Independent Board of Education (Docket No. Ky. 1196), in compliance with the requirements of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, as the application of the Pikeville City Council. Said application so adopted for the City of Pikeville is for a loan and grant from the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to build the Cline Street School Building for the Pikeville Independent Board of Education in the City of Pikeville and for the City of Pikeville."

Clyde Childers seconded Mr. Syck's motion. Upon roll call the vote was as follows:

The mayor declared said motion carried and said resolution duly passed and adopted.

Upon motion made, duly seconded and carried the city attorney is directed to prepare proper ordinance providing for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Pikeville at the regular November election, 1935, of the question whether the City of Pikeville shall incur an indebtedness in the sum of \$33,000.00 for purpose of constructing storm sewers, and present same to the council at its next meeting.

Sudie Weddington appeared before the council and asked that a street light be placed near her property on Sycamore Street, and said matter was referred to the Street Committee.
