There being no further business, on a motion made by R. G. Wells, Jr. and seconded by W. E. Venters, the Commissioners voted unamiously to adjourn the meeting.

A regular monthly meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Pikeville, convened and held in the city hall on Monday, Sept., 10, 1962 at 7:30 P.M. The following officials were present as indicated:

The City Clerk read the minutes of the previous meeting. Upon completion, the Mayor asked if there be any corrections or additions. The Commissioners having voiced no objection, the Mayor declared the minutes approved as read.

Commissioner, R. G. Wells requested that City Attorney, O. T. Hinton, give a report on the Occupational Tax Suit and the results of that suit.

O. T. Hinton stated that he filed a motion to dismiss the suit on the grounds that the petition presented an ordinance to repeal an ordinance and not new legislation as is required by the initiative statute and that it could not come under the referendum statute because that statute relates to public improvement and the Court of Appeals has specifically held that it does not apply to a revenue measure. Another reason was that the initiative statute provides that the requested ordinance must be one which the board can lawfully pass. In this case, if the ordinance repealing the occupational tax ordinance were enacted it would impair the obligations of existing contracts and would therefore be unconstitutional. The City Attorney explained that the city incurred obligations in anticipation of the revenue to be derived from the ordinance that they could not meet if the ordinance were repealed.

City Attorney, O. T. Hinton, discussed the question of whether it was an administrative or legislative act. He stated that if it was an administrative act, neither initiative or referendum apply since they apply only to legislative enactments, but the court did not think it necessary to base his decision on this point. The City Attorney proclaimed that they have the right to appeal, and that he was not advised whether they intend to appeal or not. But in any case no action could be taken requiring a vote on this question in the Nov. 1962 election. However, the attorney for the petitioners indicated that they might file an admendment attacking the validity of the ordinance, but so far they had not done so. O.T. Hinton stated that he knew of no grounds upon which it could be successfully attacked since the ordinance in question was drawn in the light of several decisions of the Court of Appeals upholding similar ordinances. The City Attorney stated that the motion was sustained by the Court.

City Manager, W. E. Butcher, made statement that the previous Federal public works grant of 50% participation had now been raised to 75%.

Dr. Edward I. Rustin, Pike County Health Officer, presented to the Board the great need for a rat control program and the importance of the cooperation of the citizens in complying with regulations concerning garbage containers. City Manager stated there was an ordinance recorded in City Ordinance Book pertaining to such regulations on good sanitary practice. Dr. Rustin confirmed that he had knowledge of this ordinance and had in his possession a copy of such ordinance. (Ordinance recorded in Penal Ordinance Book #1, Page 98, AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING ALL HOUSEHOLDERS TO HAVE GARBAGE CANS AND CONTAINERS, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO ALLOW GARBAGE, SWEEPING, DEBRIS, AND RUBBISH TO ACCUMULATE ON PREMISES, OCCUPIED BY THEM, PROHIBITING DUMPING OF GARBAGE, DEBRIS, TIN CANS, RUBBISH AND TRASH OVER THE RIVER BANK IN THE CITY OF PIKEVILLE OR ON ANY VACANT OR ANY OTHER LOT, OR ON ANY PUBLIC OR PRIVATE WAY, IN THE CITY OF PIKEVILLE. REQUIRING PRIVATE SCAVENGERS TO

REGISTER WITH THE CITY CLERK, AND PROHIBITING THE THROWING OR DEPOSITING OF GARBAGE, RUBBISH, TRASH AND DEBRIS UPON ANY PUBLIC OR PRIVATE WAY, IN THE CITY OF PIKEVILLE.

Bob Tramel of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service at the University of Kentucky, was introduced to the Board. Mr. Tramel discussed procedures to follow in the Rat Control Program and introduced desirable baits used and instructions as to their use. Mr. Tramel gave a rough estimate of cost of bait and labor used in the fight against rodents.

City Manager, W. E. Butcher, reported that the need for the rat control program had been anticipated by the Board and the current budget appropriated One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) in funds for the use of said campaign. Dr. Rustin said the amount \$1,000 should be sufficient for the remainder of this year and all of 1963. He further stated that the Health Department would assist the City in a joint campaign as soon as colder weather permits, that warmer seasons were impractical to tempt rodents to bait, as food was more abundent during the warm weather. City Manager and R. F. Gibson, health department sanitarian, were appointed by Mayor to act as a committee to expedite the campaign and to meet at their convenience.

City Commissioner, R. G. Wells, Jr. made the motion to advertise and accept bids on two miles of blacktopping for repairs to various street within the city. (Jefferson, Derby, Stratton, South College, part of Park St., Poplar, Marion, Jay, Amba, Shirley and part of Bowles Addition.) B. P. Bogardus seconded the motion and the vote on the motion was as follows:
