RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, W.E. Butcher, City Manager, and O. T. Hinton, City Attorney, reported that the City was in need of an interim loan to provide funds to meet payments due under the three contracts now in course of performance by CFW Construction Company and Acton Construction Company, which payments now due total are as follows:

WHEREAS, the funds on hand available to meet these payments, representing the balance of the proceeds of sale of revenue bonds, are insufficient for that purpose and approximately \$35,000.00 will be needed to pay the same in full, and

WHEREAS, the sum of \$282,401.00 will be due from the Housing and Home Finance Company of the Community Facilities Administration under a grant heretofore approved and \$901,296.00 will be due from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare of the Public Health Service heretofore approved, of which amounts 25% was due when the contracts were finally approved and another 50% was due when the contracts were 50% completed as shown by inspections by William P. Dillon, Field Engineer of Housing and Home Finance Agency and by A. Valcik, Field Engineer for Public Health Service on April 30, 1964 and,

WHEREAS, O. T. Hinton, City Attorney, reported that he had been assured by telephone by the responsible officals of both governmental agencies mentioned above that those funds would be paid over to the City in due course and within five or six weeks after the inspection date mentioned above, to-wit: April 30, 1964, and

WHEREAS, O. T. Hinton, City Attorney reported that he had conferred with Robert B. Johnson of the Pikeville National Bank & Trust Company of Pikeville Kentucky, concerning an interim loan of \$35,000.00 and that said bank was willing to make such a loan provided the attorney could give his personal assurance that the funds would be forthcoming from the government agencies as indicated above, which assurance he and would give,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the Mayor and City Clerk are authorized and directed to borrow \$35,000.00 from the Pikeville National Bank and Trust

Motion was veclaved possed. The Mayor read the following Ordinance in its entirety.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance prohibiting the operation of motor vehicles without mufflers.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Pikeville as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, or concern to operate or permit to be operated any vehicle propelled by any type of combustible engine or motor, including motor cycles and scooters, without a muffler of standard make and model functioning in the manner in which it was designed to function by the manufacturer thereof, so as to minimize noise from the operation of the engine or motor and any such operation is prohibited.

Any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by fine or imprisonment or both as follows:

For a first offense

\$ 5.00

For a second offense

\$25.00(not less than \$10.00 or more than \$25.00)

or 10 days imprisonment or both.

For a third offense

Snot less than \$25.00 nor more

than \$100.00

or 30 days imprisonment or both.

The Mayor read the following ordinance in its entirety:

ORDINANCE - SIDEWALKS

An ordinance prohibiting parking on side walks or restricted zones.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Pikeville as follows:


It shall be unlawful for any person, corporation or concern to park any motor vehicle of any type on any sidewalk with the city limits of the City of Pikeville or within any restricted zone marked by yellow paint on the curbing, at any time, and such parking is hereby prohibited.

It shall be the duty of the police department and members of the police force to enforce this ordinance by removing any such parked vehicles by use of a wrecker and held the vehicle so removed for the wrecker charges, and such fine or fines as may be imposed against such offender.

Any violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine or imprisonment or both as follows:

> A fine of not less than \$ 5.00 nor more than \$ 50.00 of not days or more than 30 days or both fine and imprisonment with these limits in the discretion of the Court or jury whichever tries the case.

Frederick W. Baker moved the adoption of the foregoing ordinance. Kermit Sexton seconded the motion and upon roll call the vote was as follows:



Dr. W. C. Hambley June 4, 1964 Page 2 there would be no objection on the part of the occupants of the building to annexation by the City of Pikeville. If they are given satisfactory assurances of utilities by the completion date of the building, they would be in a position to request annexation. By annexing the area in question, the City would benefit financially in that all of the doctors and their employees would be subject to the terms of the present occupational tax for the City of Pikeville. If the City is not in a position to provide utilities by the completion date of the building, the occupants of the proposed medical building would necessarily be opposed to any annexation and very probably would abandon their plans to construct such a facility on the site in question. In arriving at a decision on the foregoing, it is suggested that the City give consideration to the overall area of Ferguson Creek. If utilities are expanded so as to serve the proposed medical facility, it would necessarily follow that other businesses and residences in the same area would likewise have the benefit of these utilities. At the present time, it is the information of the undersigned that a number of buildings are going in at the location where the stock market was formerly located. That area is likewise outside the City limits and would presumably desire the benefit of city utilities. For this reason it would appear there is a need to extend utilities on Ferguson Creek to serve the proposed medical facility as well as other business establishments and residences. If anything, extension of utilities would in all probability promote the development of one kind of business or another in the area in question. If the City sees fit to extend utilities as requested in this letter, consideration can be given to prepayment of certain utilities charges by occupants of the proposed medical building.

Hon. W. C. Hambley Mayor of Pikeville Pikeville, Kentucky

Dear Mayor Hambley:

You are advised that Part B of the Offer and Acceptance document dated April 17th, 1964, is approved. On October 8, 1963, you were notified by telegram that Contracts IV and V could be awarded to the low bidders as indicated by the proposals you had submitted. Please furnish this office with a copy of the authorization to each contractor to begin construction.

The Federal grant may at no time exceed sixty-six per cent of the latest estimate of reasonable cost eligible for Federal participation. As the latest estimate of reasonable cost shown on the Part B form is \$1,365,600, the grant has been adjusted to an amount not to exceed \$901,290. This letter will serve as notification of the adjustment.
