

MINUTES } CITY OF PIKEVILLE

CONTINUED MEETING - AUGUST 20, 1984

The City of Pikeville Board of Commissioners met in a continued session on August 20, 1984 at the Old City Hall Meeting Room on Division Street.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pro Tem Harding Dawahare at 7:30 p.m. The following members were present:

John Waddell, Superintendent of Pikeville Independent Schools, inquired about the possibility of the City School District renting the building adjacent to the high school known as the Day Care Center for administrative offices. In the lower level, there would be offices for coaches, weightrooms, and dressing rooms for the ballteams. The Commission had previously discussed opening a Teen Center in this location, but they asked the Board to submit a proposal for consideration.

A bid was presented to the Commission from Sharp Construction to install storm drain lines at the Day Care Center for \$23,000.00 and \$20,668.40 if the City supplied the materials. The Commission directed that Summit Engineering be given this estimate for review and Mr. Carlton was directed to solicit bids. The Commission inquired into the progress of getting the buildings on Bank Street demolished. Commissioner Morris reported that the Army Reserve could not do this work until the third week in September. The Commission authorized the letting of bids on this project.

Bill McDonald of Howard K. Bell reported on this firm's work on the Sewage Treatment Plant's Composite Correction Plan. He reported that vital pieces of equipment of the plant are not being used and the septic tank cleaning companies' added waste load is more than this system can handle. He reported that the current staff may not be totally aware of how to efficiently operate the plant due to insufficient training. He suggests a preventative maintenance schedule with periodic inspections. The approximate cost to get the Sewage Treatment Plant fully functional is \$178,000. Some of the improvements can be spread out over a reasonable time period.

John McClure of McClure and Associates who are doing a study on the City's Solid Waste Removal needs, came before the Commission. He reported that he has been studying 3 possibilities.

1. City Solid Waste only to be burned approximately 7 tons per day would cost \$200,000.
2. City Incinerator with some County waste will generate steam for energy. Cost of system is about 1 million.
3. City/County Incinerator generate an adequate amount of steam. Cost of system about 5 - 7 million.

Mr. McClure stated he is working with the County while conducting his study.

There being no further business to discuss, Harding Dawahare made the motion, seconded by Rush Dye to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried unanimously.
