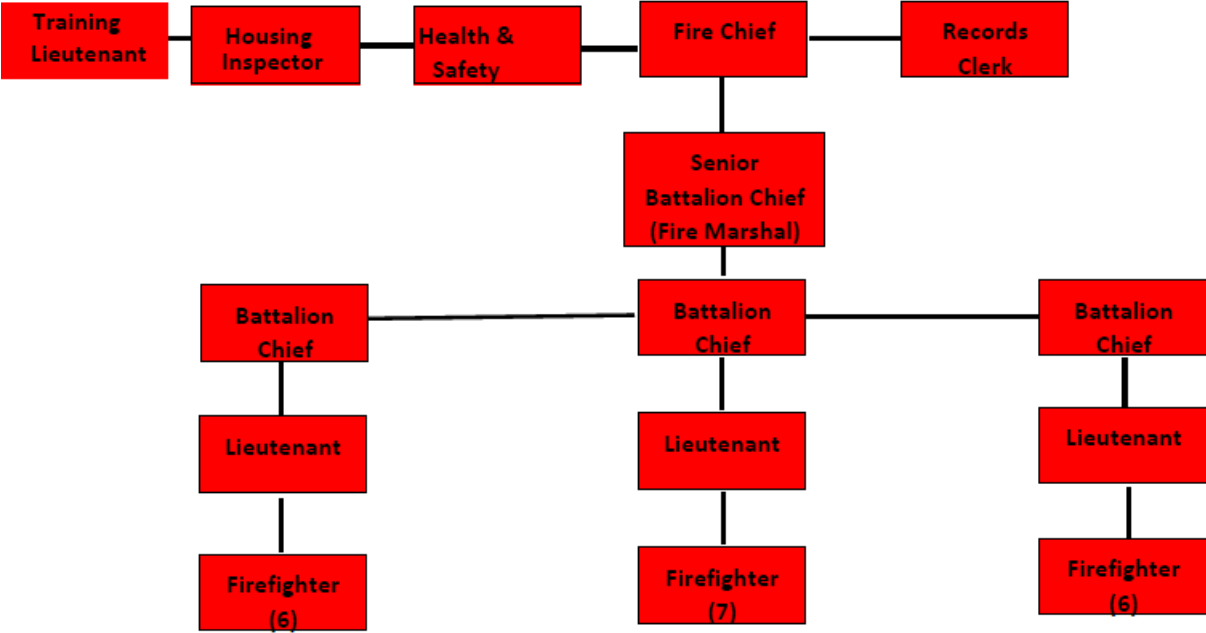

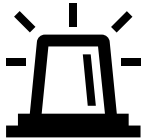

# EMS 2021 RESPONSE TIME STANDARDS

## BENCHMARK STANDARDS

When lives and property are at risk, every second of the emergency response cycle counts. The Pikeville Fire Department, guided by National Fire Protection Association Standard 1710, has benchmark standards established and reports on them annually.

### EMS TURNOUT TIME

Definition: from the time of alarm to the time unit is en route.

Standard is 60 seconds, 90% of the time.



**ACTUAL: 44 % OF THE TIME**

### EMS BASIC LIFE SUPPORT TOTAL RESPONSE TIME

Definition: from the time of alarm to the time of arrival.

Standard is 6 minutes, 90% of the time.



**ACTUAL: 66 % OF THE TIME**

### EMS TURNOUT TIME

During 2021 the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile turnout time for response was just under 1 minute 30 seconds.

### EMS BASIC LIFE SUPPORT TOTAL RESPONSE TIME

During 2021 the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile response time for response was just under 5 minutes.

# FIRE 2021 RESPONSE TIME STANDARD

## FIRE FIRST ARRIVING ENGINE AT A FIRE – 50%

Definition: from the time of alarm to the time of arrival. Standard is 6 minutes, 90% of the time.

In 2021 response time standards were met and Department average was 3 minutes and 30 secs.



**ACTUAL: 100 % OF THE TIME**

# SIGNIFICANT INCIDENTS

## March- Structure Fire (Foxcroft)

Crews received a call of a structure fire at Fox Croft. Crews responded as well as requested mutual aid from Coal Run and Shelby Valley Fire Departments. Construction crews had been working on reroofing the shake shingle roof and a pile of construction debris and caught fire. The fire was extinguished with significant damage to the garage area but the residence was left with minor smoke damage.

## July- Kayaker in Distress- Near Drowning

Crews were dispatched to a kayaker in distress. Crews responded and when arriving on scene, a bystander had been trying to assist the kayaker who was lodged nearly under a tree. Battalion Chief Kevin Miracle jumped into the water to assist. Lieutenant Matt Stevens also entered the water assisting them to shore. While Miracle and Stevens were in the water. Firefighters Charlie Sexton, Kevin Fox, Austin Akers, Robert Gile, and Battalion Chief Jamie Sparks. Miracle and Stevens were Awarded a Life Saving Award. The rest of the crew were awarded a Unit Citation.



## **August- High Angle Rescue in the Cut Through**

Crews were dispatched to a person stuck on a ledge on the high wall inside of the Pikeville Cut Through Project. Crews later found that Pikeville Police Officers had been observing for a suspicious person near the Dog Park on Bob Amos and that person he jumped into the river and crossed the other side and became stuck. Crew set up for a High Angle Rescue. Once crews were with the person, they were secured and safely brought to US 23.



# SPECIAL OPERATIONS

## TECHNICAL RESCUE

The Pikeville Fire Department has Technician Level responders in the following disciplines: Rescue Systems, Vehicle Extrication, Rope Rescue, Confined Space, Trench, Structural Collapse and Machinery Search and Rescue. These low frequency high risk events require initial and ongoing training of the Technician Level responders, properly maintained equipment.



## **WILDLAND FIREFIGHTING**

Due to the large amounts of brush and wildland-urban interface areas in Pikeville, the Department has a special crew designated, trained and equipped to fight these fires and protect homes threatened by them.

These members responded on 2 active wildland mobilizations that included approximately 40 acres. Additionally, crews responded to 11 brush fires throughout 2021.

The unit is always ready and able at a moments notice. To assist with this, as well as continued collaboration with the Kentucky Division of Forestry the unit conducted its annual retraining and physical fitness test.

Two new crew members were added to the unit in 2021 (Will Crum and Marcus Riddle).

New equipment was able to be purchased for the unit with a \$300 donation from Harbor Freight Tools.



## WATER RESCUE

The Pikeville Fire Department has a Technician Level Surface Water Rescue program with 14 trained rescue swimmers.

The team was deployed 3 times during the year for responses both within the City as well as requested by neighboring areas.

During 2021 6 additional personnel received the required certifications to be added to the team.

# SUPPORT SERVICES

The Bureau of Support Services is comprised of the Fire Training and Supply & Maintenance Divisions. Both works collaboratively to ensure our personnel have the proper knowledge, skills, tools, and equipment to safely and effectively respond to emergency calls for service.

- Outfitted all members with new turnout boots from 2020 KY Fire Commission PPE grant (\$10,000).
- Awarded 2021 KY Fire Commission Training Facility Grant in the amount of \$17,500.00, for upgrades to the “Live Fire Burn Building.”
- Purchased and began implementation of LMS, Check-it, and upgraded our scheduling software.
- Applied for 2022 KY Fire Commission Personal Protective Equipment Grant.
- Tested 320 Fire Hydrants
- Painted and Conducted Maintenance on 150 Fire Hydrants
- Flow Tested 234 sections of fire hose (1 ½”=111, 2 failures)(3”=64, 2 failures)(5”=59, 1 failure)
- Self-contained Breathing Apparatus Flow tested for safe operation
- Annual Ariel Apparatus testing completed
- All Fire Pumps underwent Annual pump testing
- Awarded 2021 KY Fire Commission Fire Based EMS Grant in the amount of \$14,865.00
- Purchased 2022 Horton Type I Ambulance (Station 3)

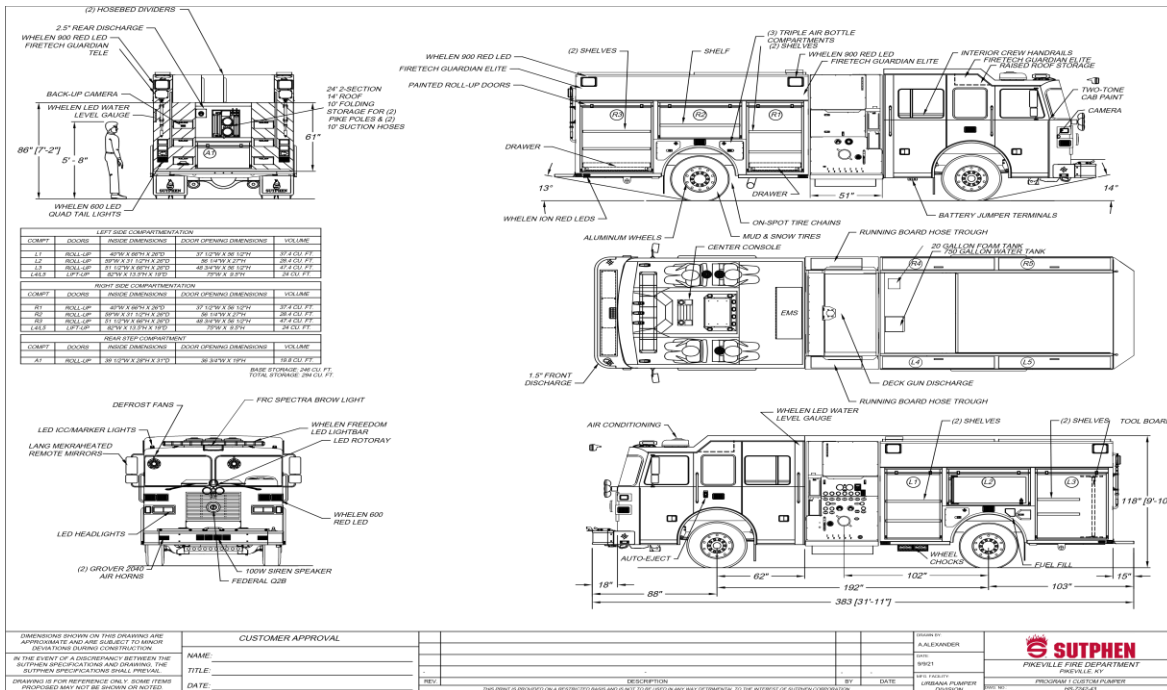


## **2021 New Apparatus Information**

The City made a progressive investment in the continued success of the department by purchasing 3-new fire apparatuses. In early March 2021, the fire department was instructed research different styles of purchasing avenues from multiple vendors. After 3 months of gathering information and numerous meetings the Commission agreed to purchase 3-new fire apparatuses, 2 custom pumpers (identical) and 1 custom aerial. These trucks were purchased from The Sutphen Corporation out of Dublin Ohio. Sutphen has been a family-owned pioneer in the fire truck world dating back to 1890. To this day, Sutphen is still a family owned/operated business with locations in Ohio and Pennsylvania. The department currently houses 2-Sutphen aerial fire trucks. These trucks are estimated to be delivered late fall/winter 2022. A brief description of these trucks is below:

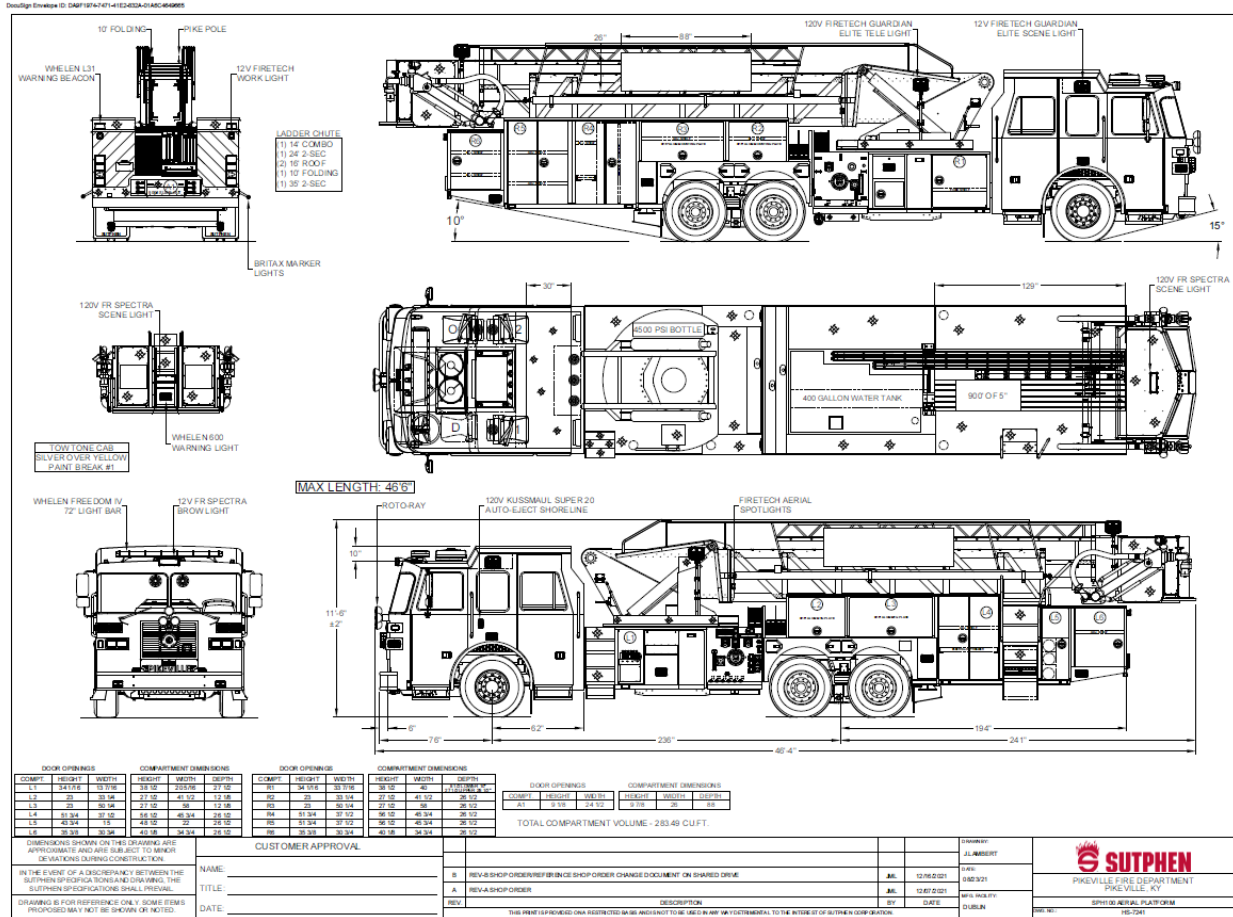
2-custom pumpers:

- 750-gallon water reservoir, 20-gallon class A foam cell.
- Hale Q-max 2000 GPM pump.

- 2022 100' rear mount aerial platform on a 62" custom 4 person cab, Monarch heavy duty chassis.
- 500hp Cummins motor.
- Allison Gen 5 transmission.
- 100' aerial tower with bucket.
- 400-gallon water reservoir.
- 2000 GPM Hale Q-max pump.

# TRAINING

The Training Division is charged with developing and improving firefighting techniques as well as standards for rescue and emergency medical services. Our training division also evaluates and maintains quality control of firefighting methods. Heading the Division is Lieutenant Brandon Hayton.

The training division manages a variety of programs to train and protect firefighters and staff. The division works cooperatively with various local and regional partners to enhance our capabilities and resources. Our training partners include the Kentucky Fire Commission, particularly State Fire Rescue Training District 11, Pike County Emergency Management, American National University and local area Fire Departments.

# PREVENTION

The Fire Prevention Division headed by Senior Battalion Chief/Fire Marshal Kenny Sampson, serves the public by providing fire and life safety inspections, community education, and fire investigation services. These functions help prevent fires, enhance public safety in all buildings and improve emergency responder’s ability to manage an incident. By doing this, we help achieve a safe, vibrant and economically sustainable city.

Included within the Division is the Housing Inspector Robby Lindsey. This position is responsible for conducting inspections of housing units, checking for compliance with the Housing and Urban Development Standards as well as City ordinances. The office also works in collaboration of the City’s utility office in conducting utility inspections.

# COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

The best way Pikeville Fire can meet the public safety needs of the communities we serve is to reduce risk and prevent as many fire and medical emergencies as possible. To be effective in this mission we work to establish relationships with community groups, schools, building managers, health care workers and area businesses. These relationships help us understand the various risks within each community in order for us to design educational programs and mitigation strategies to address them.

Year round our facilities are open and available for the public. This provides us a chance to get to know the residents we serve, as well as allow the citizens to meet our personnel and equipment. A wide variety of fire safety information and educational programs are afforded to all who visit. Of course, we also have a few things to make the visit fun! Kids can climb on our fire apparatus and have photos taken, try on firefighter gear and even try their hand at a real fire extinguisher.

Other key programs include assisting with blood pressure and blood glucose screenings at health events, teaching fire safety and escape planning to schools and businesses.





The Department was also able to make the purchase of an updated Sparky the Fire Dog Costume with funding made possible with 2021 Kentucky Fire Commission Fire Prevention Grant Funding (\$1,000). This costume assists the Departments fire prevention program, making learning fire safety both education and fun at the same time.





## CPR

The Pikeville Fire Department has 12 American Heart Association (AHA) certified CPR and First Aid Instructors that provide numerous trainings throughout the year for businesses and members of the general public. After completing training provided by our personnel, students will go out into the world equipped with the knowledge and ability to provide first response life saving efforts when seconds count.

Firefighter Tackett also had ties to the City, being an employee of the Utility Management Group prior to making a career change.



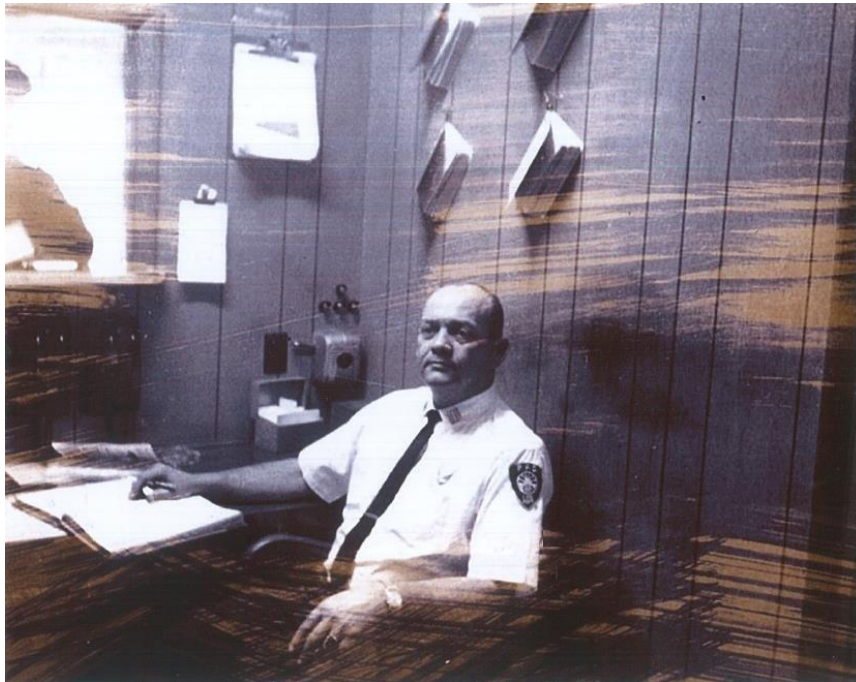
## Awards
